Weekly Update and Analysis

August 1, 2025

Brooks Bawden Moore's Weekly Update and Analysis highlights congressional, administrative, and regulatory activity related to justice, public safety, and homeland security. What Happened This Week?

This week, the Trump Administration, through the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), announced billions of dollars in federal grant funding for state, local, tribal, and territorial partners through programs designed to strengthen the nation's response to terrorism, cybersecurity threats, and immigration and border enforcement.

Most significant for state, local, tribal, territorial, and campus law enforcement partners is the \$375.5 million available to all 56 states and territories through the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) and the \$81 million allocated to local law enforcement agencies at or near the border through the Operation Stonegarden Grant Program (OPSG). Other notable funding includes the Nonprofit Security Grant Program, which provides target hardening resources to at-risk institutions, and the State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program. Notably, the notices of funding opportunities did not include the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI), a critical program that provides federal funding to help high-threat, high-density urban areas prevent, protect against, respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism. Major metropolitan regions and their surrounding communities, which rely on these resources, continue to wait for the program's release, which is typically funded much earlier in the fiscal year.

In an effort to combat illicit drug trafficking, counterfeit goods, unsafe imports, and persistent trade imbalances, the Trump Administration signed an [executive order suspending the exemption](#) that allowed imports valued at \$800 or less to enter the U.S. duty free and often subject to reduced inspection.

In Congress, the House began its six-week summer district work period, while the Senate continued advancing priority nominations and appropriations bills.

Under pressure from the White House to accelerate nominations and with an eye toward positioning themselves for negotiations with the House on FY 2026 appropriations, Senators worked to mark up two more bills (Defense and Labor-HHS) and continued negotiations on passing individual spending bills, such as Commerce-Justice-Science, on the floor. The Senate confirmed [Gadyaces Serralta](#) as Director of the U.S. Marshals Service, [Matthew Kozma](#) as DHS Under Secretary of Intelligence and Analysis, [Joe Kent](#) as Director of the National Counterterrorism Center, [T. Elliot Gaiser](#) to lead DOJ's Office of Legal Counsel, and DOJ official and former Trump attorney [Emil Bove](#) to a lifetime seat on the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

The Senate Homeland Security Committee also voted to advance [Sean Plankey](#) to be Director of the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency and [Pedro Allende](#) to serve as Under Secretary for Science and Technology at DHS.

The Senate unanimously approved two policing-related bills: the [Chief Herbert D. Proffitt Act](#) and the [Improving Police Critical Aid for Responding to Emergencies \(CARE\) Act](#). These measures seek to extend Public Safety Officer Benefits and establish standards for trauma kits.

The Senate continues work today and may remain in session through the weekend to confirm additional nominations and potentially vote on FY 2026 funding bills. Sweaty and exhausted Capitol Hill staff, along with many government affairs teams, are eagerly waiting to begin the cherished August district work period, scheduled to start next week.

When the Senate officially leaves town, both the House and Senate are not scheduled to return until September 2nd.

A Tribute to Dan Mahoney



The BBM team is mourning the loss of our good friend Daniel Mahoney. Dan passed away on Wednesday, July 30th after a courageous battle with cancer.

Dan served as Deputy Director of the Northern California Regional Intelligence Center (NCRIC) from 2013 to 2021 and continued serving as the NCRIC's Privacy Officer until just two months ago. He joined the NCRIC upon retiring in 2013 from the San Francisco Police Department as a Commander after 31 years of service.

Dan was a member of the Executive Board of the National Fusion Center Association (NFCA), serving as Treasurer for several years until early 2025, and as Regional Director for Pacific Region. He eagerly provided guidance, mentorship, and wisdom to fusion center leaders and personnel around the country. Dan was committed to building the nation's capacity to analyze and share information about threats to public safety. In support of the National Network of Fusion Centers, Dan led efforts to develop and update nationwide guidance on privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties, and served on the Executive Oversight Committee for the NFCA's Cyber Intelligence Operations subcommittee.

Dan also served on the executive board of the Multi-State Information Sharing & Analysis Center (MS-ISAC) and was Chair of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) Law Enforcement Information & Technology Section in 2020-21.

In recognition of his contributions and accomplishments, Dan received many awards including from DHS for his work ensuring that privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties considerations are always prioritized, and from the Director of National Intelligence for his work supporting the National Mission Center pilot.

The National Fusion Center Association bestowed its highest honor – the Lifetime Achievement Award – to Dan in 2024.

Dan was also a successful businessperson. Together with his brother, Dan founded Traffic Collision Consultants, Inc. He maintained active accreditation and certification as a reconstructionist and was a board-certified Forensic Examiner who held Fellow status. He was named to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's Advisory Council. During his career with SFPD, Dan created the agency's first Major Accident Investigation Team (MAIT) and was responsible for providing forensic reconstruction services for the Office of the District Attorney.

BBM team members were beneficiaries of Dan's wisdom, guidance, friendship, and sharp needling frequently throughout the years. You never needed a long conversation to get from Dan his raw – and always helpful – thoughts. He cared for people in all facets of his life and cared about doing the right things the right way.

Dan provided an example that everyone who was privileged to know him can draw from even when he is no longer with us.

S.2480 - Telecom Cybersecurity Transparency Act

This bill would require the Secretary of Homeland Security to publicly release, in full, the unclassified report titled “U.S. Telecommunications Insecurity 2022” that was prepared for the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency.

S.911 - Chief Herbert D. Proffitt Act of 2025

This bill would amend the Public Safety Officers’ Benefits (PSOB) program, which provides death or disability benefits to federal, state, and local law enforcement officers. Specifically, the bill would extend eligibility to retired law enforcement officers who are killed or permanently disabled as a direct result of their

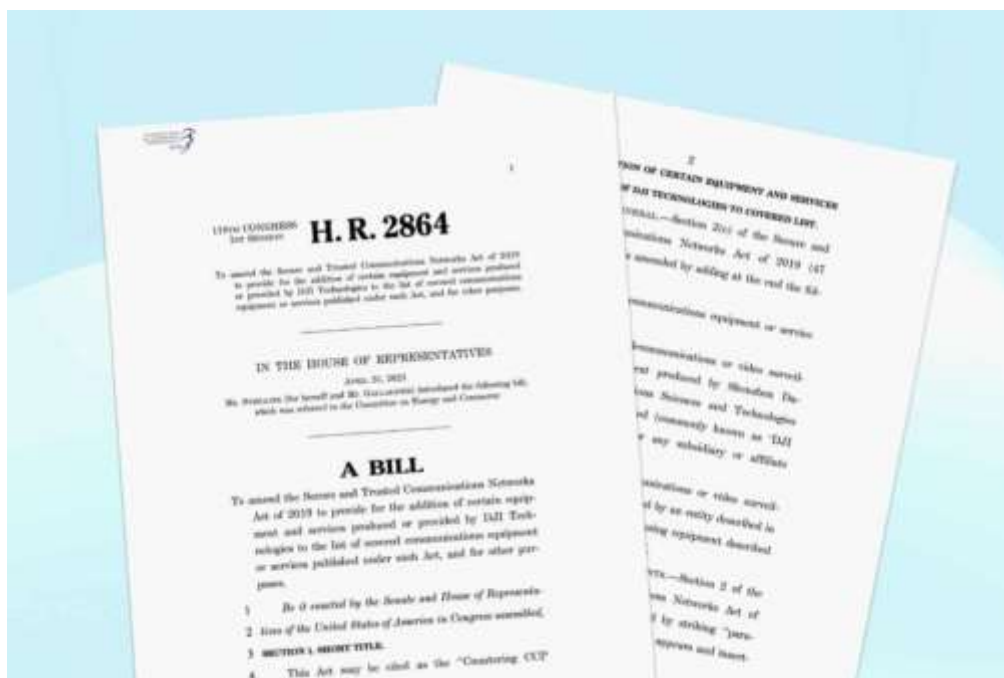

Terrance C. Cole Sworn in as Administrator of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration

Terrance C. "Terry" Cole was sworn in as DEA Administrator on July 23, 2025, following his confirmation by the U.S. Senate. Mr. Cole is a distinguished public servant who has spent more than 31 years in law enforcement, 22 of which were at DEA fighting the drug cartels and transnational criminal organizations. Since 2023, Mr. Cole has served as Virginia's Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security in Governor Youngkin's cabinet overseeing 11 state public safety agencies, comprising more than 19,000 employees.

Mr. Cole's appointment by the Trump Administration to lead the nation's largest drug enforcement agency places him at the forefront of the fight against Foreign Terrorist Organizations, which use drugs, violence, and crime to threaten public safety and national security.

Administrator Cole's strategic priorities reflect a renewed focus on enforcement, partnership, and public safety to meet the evolving threats of the global drug crisis. These priorities include:

- Affirming DEA's Commitment to Enforcement – targeting traffickers, removing poison from the streets of this country, and protecting the vulnerable.
- Dismantling the Mexican Cartels, which operate as terrorist organizations, by targeting and breaking their command, control, and distribution networks that drive the fentanyl crisis.
- Disrupting the Criminal Chemical Supply Chain that supply the chemical ingredients used in the manufacture of fentanyl.
- Reducing Drug-Fueled Violence in America's most affected cities through expanded partnerships with state and local law enforcement.
- Following the Money – targeting illicit finance and the growing use of cryptocurrency.
- Leading the Fight on the Cyber and Dark Web Frontlines by targeting the digital pipelines that fuel drug trafficking.
- Strengthening Partnerships Across the Country and with Foreign Counterparts to drive coordinated enforcement efforts against transnational criminal organizations.
- Prioritizing the Wellness of DEA's Workforce, recognizing that the agency's greatest strength is its people.

Safeguarding lives: The urgent need for congressional action on illicit Xylazine

America's opioid epidemic has entered a new and especially dangerous phase, as synthetic fentanyl and deadly additives devastate families and communities across the country. Congress must act now to equip law enforcement with the resources and tools they need to keep communities safe, while preventing unintended consequences on hardworking veterinarians, farmers and ranchers.

Today, foreign manufactured, illicit fentanyl and fentanyl-related substances drive the opioid epidemic. Despite being 50 to 100 times stronger than their prescription counterparts, these synthetic opioids are often mixed with toxic cutting agents to increase potency and street value, while decreasing production costs.

In recent years, cartels and criminal organizations have increasingly used xylazine, a powerful veterinary sedative, as a low-cost cutting agent for illicit fentanyl. This lethal combination is known as “tranq.”

Designated as an emerging threat to the United States in 2023, illicit xylazine poses grave health and safety risks when ingested by humans, including depressed breathing and heart rate, unconsciousness, severe necrosis and death. As of 2022, the Drug Enforcement Administration had seized xylazine and fentanyl mixtures in 48 states.

At the same time, licit xylazine has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for veterinary use since 1972 and remains a critical tool for veterinarians, farmers and ranchers. They use this drug to treat livestock and wildlife. In cattle, xylazine is the only safe and effective drug. There is no alternative.

Currently, the DEA is in the process of making xylazine a controlled substance; however, scheduling xylazine without protecting its legitimate use may limit veterinary professionals’ ability to treat animals and could increase the risk of supply disruption. Further, given xylazine is a low-volume, low-margin, generic animal drug, high regulatory burdens could force the few remaining domestic manufacturers to discontinue production altogether.

Congress must fight the spread of illicit xylazine while preserving its veterinary use.

Justice and Public Safety Leaders Chart AI Priorities

During a recent briefing on Capitol Hill, leaders and members of national associations considered artificial intelligence use cases and topics, along with a new playbook guiding the technology's ethical, scalable adoption.

Across the country, public safety and justice agencies are piloting and scaling artificial intelligence tools to automate tasks and extend staff capacity. At the same time, professional organizations and associations are collaborating on use cases, working on best practices and influencing national policy.

At a recent Capitol Hill briefing co-hosted by the Congressional Artificial Intelligence Caucus and the IJIS Institute, public safety leaders highlighted how AI is beginning to reshape justice and law enforcement operations. From automatically drafted police reports to smart 911 triage, the applications are expanding rapidly. Vendors like Motorola and CentralSquare are investing heavily in AI integrations, signaling a shift in everyday public safety functions.

The briefing, July 11 in Washington, D.C., featured panelists from major justice organizations. Speakers emphasized practical AI use cases like e-filing, digital forensics and language translation, and discussed tools that could help address persistent staffing gaps. Organizations represented included the Major County Sheriffs of America, the Association of State Criminal Investigative Agencies, the American Correctional Association, the National White Collar Crime Center, the National Center for State Courts, and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

Their focus on low-risk, high-impact applications for AI also underpins the Artificial Intelligence Playbook for Justice, Public Safety and Security Professionals, published this spring by the IJIS Institute, formerly named the Integrated Justice Information Systems Institute. The guide was part of the conversation, and it aims to help agencies adopt AI responsibly and sustainably, with built-in protections for privacy, fairness and transparency.

The playbook was developed by an IJIS-led AI working group, and more than 35 participants collaborated on the final product. They included federal, state, local, tribal and international justice agencies; 11 mission-area associations; and multiple AI vendors, Ashwini Jarral, IJIS Institute strategic adviser, said via email. The playbook came out of repeated questions from justice leaders, he said.

“Where does AI fit? How do we move forward responsibly? How do we evaluate vendors?’ Since there was no resource available to address these questions, IJIS decided to take the lead in developing the playbook as one ... to help guide AI adoption.”

Police officer's death in Lorain, Ohio, marks latest in growing trend of ambush attacks on law enforcement

Wednesday's attack is the latest in a growing trend of ambush attacks against police officers across the country this year. Data analyzed by the CBS News Crime Unit shows at least 50 law enforcement officers have been shot in ambush attacks so far this year — on track to exceed the 2024 total of 80. The numbers significantly spiked in 2023, when 138 officers were ambushed.
