DOJ Releases New \$3 Billion Public Safety Grant Program



U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS

The Department of Justice has released a new **\$3 billion grant program** created through the One Big Beautiful Bill Act to support state, local, tribal, and territorial agencies involved in immigration enforcement, criminal investigations, drug trafficking, human trafficking, detention, prosecution, transportation, and related public safety activities.

Funding is available for:

- **Personnel** – including law enforcement officers, investigators, analysts, prosecutors, detention personnel, transportation personnel, and other criminal justice staff.
- **Technology and Equipment** – including investigative and intelligence technologies, communications systems, analytics platforms, equipment, training, maintenance, and related operational capabilities.
- **Temporary Detention Facilities** – including construction, expansion, renovation, and modernization projects.

Eligible activities include locating and apprehending criminal illegal aliens, supporting gang, cartel, drug trafficking, and human trafficking investigations, expanding prosecution, court, detention, and transportation capabilities, and enhancing related law enforcement operations.

Applicants must participate in (or commit to participate in) a 287(g) partnership and a Homeland Security Task Force (HSTF) or other major DOJ enforcement effort.

The program does **not require a match** and awards may support projects for up to 60 months.

Funding will be awarded on a rolling basis through multiple application rounds until available funds are exhausted.

The first application round is due **July 15, 2026 (Grants.gov)** and **July 17, 2026 (JustGrants)**.

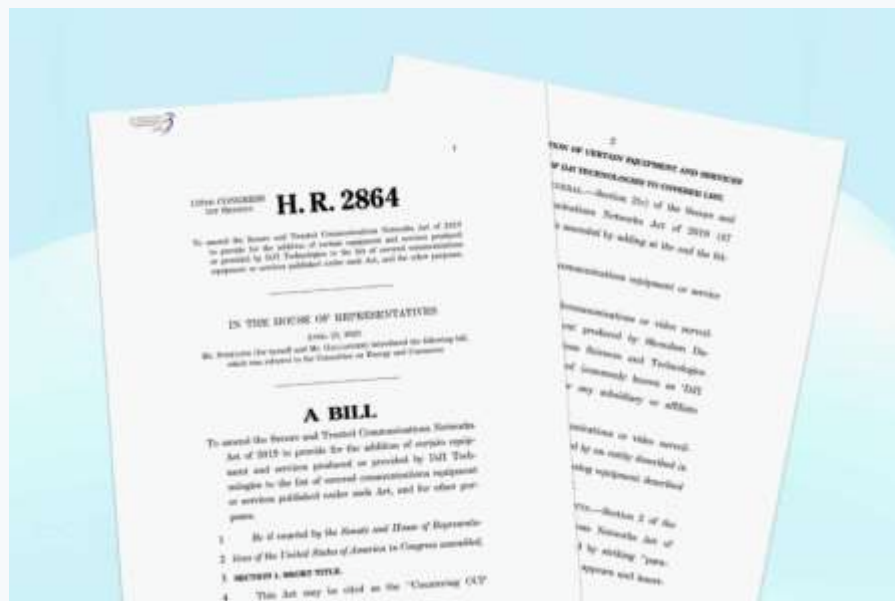

National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund Announces May 2026 Officers of the Month

Officer recognized for quick action during a multi-vehicle crash that left a young child trapped in a burning car

WASHINGTON, D.C. (June 17, 2026) – The **National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF)** today announced Officer Michael Jaycox

of the San Jose Police Department (CA) as the Officer of the Month for May 2026. Officer Jaycox was selected for his actions in rescuing a 4-year-old child trapped inside a burning vehicle following a serious multi-vehicle crash.

In early May, San Jose Police Department officers responded to a major traffic collision involving multiple vehicles. Following the crash, one of the vehicles became engulfed in flames while an adult driver and a young child remained trapped inside.

Officer Jaycox was among the first officers to arrive at the scene. Recognizing the immediate danger, he rushed to the burning vehicle and worked to rescue the occupants before the fire could spread further. Despite the risks posed by the flames and rapidly evolving conditions, Officer Jaycox successfully removed the child from the backseat and assisted in extracting the driver, transferring both to awaiting medical personnel.

Additional officers and emergency responders provided aid to the other individuals involved in the collision, several of whom were transported to local hospitals for treatment.



“Officer Jaycox's actions exemplify the courage and selflessness law enforcement officers demonstrate in service to their communities,” **said Bill Alexander, CEO of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund.** “Without hesitation, he placed himself in harm’s way to rescue a child

trapped inside a burning vehicle. His actions undoubtedly saved a life, and we are proud to recognize him as our Officer of the Month for May 2026.”

The Officer of the Month Award Program is sponsored by the **Police Unity Tour** and recognizes federal, state, and local officers who distinguish themselves through exemplary law enforcement service and devotion to duty.



The Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, District Attorney's Office requested assistance from the MAGLOCLN analytical staff regarding an upcoming home invasion, robbery, and homicide trial.

The MAGLOCLN analyst was tasked with creating demonstrative aids to assist the jury in understanding the events surrounding the crimes, as well as relevant locations to the crime. The MAGLOCLN analyst prepared detailed crime scene diagrams of the homicide location, including aerial imagery of the relevant locations, as well as a comprehensive timeline of events, which included incriminating text messages between the three codefendants.



These diagrams were used extensively during the defendant's trial, resulting in guilty verdicts on all charges. The three defendants were sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

That's over now. All four county departments tied into the same system. They will get a hit in hours. Hours. Same gun turns up at three different scenes across the islands? You know it by morning.

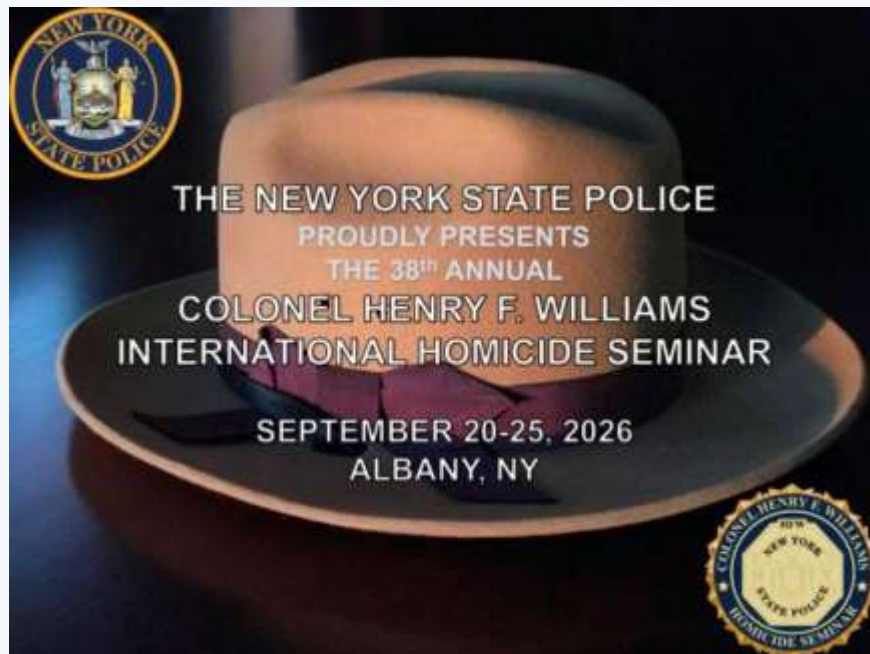
Ghost gun seizures jumped from 52 to 88 in one year out there. One year. And they just now got the tool to connect the dots.

The Trace: Philadelphia Approves Benefits for Families of First Responders Lost to Suicide

The Philadelphia City Council unanimously passed legislation June 11 to give death benefits to the families of police officers and other first responders whose suicides were linked to on-the-job trauma.

The measure passed just weeks after The Trace reported on local families who'd lost pensions, health insurance, and other benefits after the suicide of a loved one. Once the bill becomes law, it will make Philadelphia one of the few places in the country that classifies first responder suicides as in-the-line-of-duty deaths.

The bill pitted the majority-Democratic Council against Mayor Cherelle Parker, a fellow Democrat whose administration opposed the measure at least partly because of concerns about its cost. While the Council has enough votes to override a veto, Parker declined to say whether she would sign the measure. "On that legislation, I have to talk to my finance team along with my research team," the mayor told The Trace.

The city estimates that the average cost to pay a claim stemming from the suicide of a married police officer with two minor children would be nearly \$1.7 million. Eight Philadelphia police officers died by suicide between 2021 and 2023, according to Police Department data. There have been no officer suicides since 2023.

Councilmembers and suicide survivors said financial concerns do not outweigh the need to help the families of first responders, who are often exposed to traumatic incidents that can damage their mental health.

“You have individuals who are first responders who suffer from trauma because they see kids with their brains blown out. They come onto the scene and see people who’ve been murdered,” Council President Kenyatta Johnson said. “That’s a lot of trauma that a person has to deal with over and over.”

The new law will allow surviving family members to receive lifetime pension benefits. To qualify, the first responder who died by suicide must have been diagnosed with a psychiatric disorder related to a traumatic event experienced in the line of duty, or have died within 45 days of such an event. The law will apply to uniformed members of the Fire and Police departments as well as members of the District Attorney’s Office whose suicides occurred on or after July 1, 2016.

“If you die in a car crash, you get that money. But if you are at home suffering from post traumatic stress from all of those years and you commit suicide, that’s an occupational hazard too,” said Councilmember Curtis Jones, who introduced the bill.

Suicide survivors praised the measure. “It’s a huge win for someone like me who’s been trying so hard to fight for this,” said Regan Falk, whose husband, Kevin Regan, 30, died by suicide in 2022 after eight years as a Philadelphia officer. “It gives me hope for all of the families that have been affected by suicide and mental health within the first responder community.”

“The voices of the families have finally, really been heard,” said Emily Chau Gray, whose husband, Bryan Gray, a 36-year-old Pennsylvania state trooper, died by suicide two years ago.

Gray testified in support of Philadelphia’s bill even though she would not qualify for benefits because her husband was not a city employee. After her husband’s death, Gray also began lobbying state lawmakers to provide death benefits to survivors of first responder suicide across Pennsylvania. Her efforts resulted in state legislation named for her husband, Bryan’s Law, which is now being considered by both the House and the Senate. Gray believes Philadelphia’s passage of a similar bill will help build momentum in the state Legislature.

“Any progress is progress,” she said. “I’m very proud of the work that I advocated for, and that the Philadelphia City Council has passed it unanimously.”

During a June 3 meeting of the Council’s Finance Committee, the city’s risk manager, Sharolyn Murphy, testified that Parker’s administration opposed the bill because it would rather put the money toward prevention programs. She even suggested that the law could encourage suicide by providing a generous benefit, straining the pension fund.

Councilmember Rue Landau sharply criticized the administration's focus on cost. "What we're asking for is to have these benefits go to survivors," Landau said. "These are death benefits, and you are now parsing out acceptable types of death and unacceptable types of death, and I find that outrageous."

Committee Chair Katherine Gilmore Richardson apologized to those viewing the hearing online and on TV, saying Murphy's testimony might have been traumatic. "Many of us in this room have lost loved ones to this very issue," she said. "Obviously, we all want to do all that we can from a prevention standpoint, but that does not always happen."

The Council voted 17-0 to pass the measure.
